The unit has flourished (largely thanks to the previous grant from LLTC) and we now have 18 members with a range of additional needs including physical disabilities, autism, non-verbal autism and challenges with vision. We adapt the national programme activities to incorporate all our members learning styles as much as we possibly can. We have thought carefully about what the girls in the unit would really benefit from by discussions amongst the leaders team, observing the girls during meetings and asking parents for their feedback. The speaker will allow us to play relevant music to listen to and aid understanding e.g. examples of certain genres. Also to provide a calming time during the meeting and also to aid understanding e.g. hear examples of other languages.</p> <p>The light panel will be a highly valued addition to our sensory table and engage the interest of the members who find engaging a little more difficult. Also this will aid the older girls with visual learning as their main learning style.</p> <p>The sensory mat is highly appropriate for all ages and will be part of our physical resources as well as being used for games. This mat is versatile with many different purposes/uses and we plan to encourage some of the older members to help set up the physical skills area developing their sense of responsibility. Our physical area is also highly valued during meetings, a young member can choose to go use it if she needs a break from the activities or time to calm etc.</p> <p>We really want to show our amazing girls that they can do anything and they have loved going out and about in the local area. We have visited places such as Whipsnade Zoo, Tiddenfoot Waterside Park and Thrift Road play area. The unit would highly benefit from a swimming session at Tiddenfoot Leisure centre which is local to the meeting place. This would occur a high cost for the unit as each girl regardless of their age must bring an adult carer due to their additional needs (Tickets junior £2.85 x 18 is £51.30, £4.55 x 18 is £81.90).</p>

As a result, the numbers for each group are much lower than pre-covid and the leaders are working hard to rebuild the units with a hope to achieve 24-30 girls each, approx. 90 in total. In the meantime, all income from subscriptions goes towards the cost of hall hire and any materials needed for the meetings.</p> <p>The funding sought for the shed and shelving units will allow camping equipment, craft materials, outdoor sports equipment etc to be stored safely and securely on the school site. Currently the leaders transport limited materials each week to the meeting which restricts the activities that can take place. By storing everything on site and having an opportunity to store any items donated to the groups, it will be a great support to offer better meeting activities, outdoor games and a fantastic experience for all who attend.</p>

We provide training and leadership opportunities to boys and girls between ages 10 and 18 based around the values and specialisations of the Royal Navy & Royal Marines. Structured training classes are run in Seamanship, First Aid, Catering, Target Rifle, Navigation (Ashore & Afloat), Adventure Training, Fieldcraft and Engineering. The organisation is operated by volunteers utilising their professional skills to train the Cadets during weekly Parade Nights and ad-hoc weekend events. We support Cadets\'\' Duke of Edinburgh Award programmes delivered through their schools by providing Skills, Physical and Expedition based training modules and coaching.

Many of our Cadets, in particular the Marines section, like outdoor exercises. For example, we held night navigation and fieldcraft workshops in Oct/Nov around Rushmere which were full. They have been keen to persuade us to organise something else and we have confirmed a visit to the Brecon Beacons during late March which is again looking popular and will also be training ahead of this season\'\'s Duke of Edinburgh expeditions with their schools. Last year\'\'s local

events highlighted the inadequacy of our rucksacks for adventure training events, of which only 2 are suitable and serviceable (one having been repaired.) These are essential for carrying personal and safety equipment for even a basic day in the hills and we are keen to invest in 6 replacements in order to support a team of 8 Cadets (by and large instructors have their own, but they are expensive investments for families.) Cadets may also borrow our equipment for their DofE expeditions if necessary. Along with this, we hope to invest in 8 hi-vis waterproof covers and 6 maps covering the area of the exercise for sharing between Cadets and instructors. Millets L.B. have offered to apply a 20% group discount on the rucksacks if this beats the current retail sale price (which could not be guaranteed) and the product pricing is summarised in the attached document.

Leighton Linslade Helpers is a collective of volunteers who came together to support their community through the Covid 19 lockdown in their town and surrounding areas. It very quickly grew into an organisation that is continuing to support its community by becoming a charity (1196332). What started off as an emergency food bank to those in hardship or those shielding, without access to food, has since grown into a range of services, from food parcels, prescription deliveries, welfare checks, counselling and listening, free-cycling, personal shopping, Marshalling at Test and Vaccine Centres and more recently the creation of Leighton Buzzards Community Fridge, to many other ways of supporting families, the elderly and the isolated. We have assisted our local agencies, schools and our local authority and other foodbanks, with a range of requests including responding to emergencies across Bedfordshire in our own right and in collaboration with other groups and charities. We are now established in our new High Street premises and will continue to support our community, agencies and our local authority as we have recently been appointed as the local CERT (Community Emergency Response Team) by BLEVEC. Our main objective is the relief of those in need, by reason of youth, age, ill-health, disability, financial hardship or other social or economic disadvantage, in particular but not exclusively by:-

- Operating a community food bank; and Community Fridge**
- Providing furniture, household goods and clothing;**
- Signposting to other agencies such as the CAB;**
- Delivering prescriptions (to people in isolation);**
- Providing a personal shopping service (to people in isolation);**
- Providing transport to attend hospital appointments;**
- Providing a counselling and listening service;**
- Providing a support network for our volunteers; and**
- By providing access to training for our volunteers**

We wish to open a community fridge in the Meadow Way Residents Centre. What is a Community Fridge A Community Fridge is a space where everyone can share surplus food, including donations from local food businesses, supermarkets, producers, households and gardens. Access is open to everyone in our community who wish to use it, either to donate surplus food that we can accept, or to access food that is available. This self help scheme, without referral, means testing, or with a set limit of use. It will help to eliminate food wastage and reduce landfill waste, in a time when we are all looking to reduce the carbon footprint, emissions and pollution. This food would just be thrown out and put into landfill. There are 3 main benefits to this community initiative. The supermarkets save on wastage, the food goes to the community, the environment benefits from less landfill, tackling pollution. Leighton Linlade's community is growing with an approximate population of 45,000. We have 6 of the main major supermarkets in our town, so there is the potential of a lot of waste. The community will benefit directly by having access to this food, assisting those in need as well as those wishing to do their bit to save the planet. There is a great need for projects like these that are springing up all around the country through schemes such as Neighbourly, Faireshare, Hubbub and Olio. We have seen the success of the first Community Fridge at one end of the town, however, many people don't drive and there are a large number of housing estates surrounding the Meadow Way Community Centre, including the new build at Eggington. We will measure this project in the same way we do the High Street Fridge, by footfall. We currently average 40-60 visitors a day and we are confident that this will be a similar footfall for Meadow Way. We wish to spend this grant money on a double fronted upright glass fridge to house the fresh produce. We already have a large commercial chest freezer which we will provide to the project. The other parts of the funding not coming from LLTC will go towards making the area housing the community fridge accessible to wheelchairs, prams etc and to purchase ancillary equipment/marketing and advertising to get the Fridge up and running.

I am one of the four Leaders who have been selected to lead the group of 36 Scouts aged 14-18 from Bedfordshire to the 25th World Scout Jamboree (WSJ) in Korea in August 2023. Of those 36 young people, 3 of them are from the Leighton-Linslade District Scouts/geographical area. The WSJ is run every four years in different countries around the world. More than fifty thousand young people from one hundred and sixty countries will be attending the Korean WSJ, and everyone will be celebrating being party of a global family of Scouts. The WSJ not only teaches new

skills but gives the opportunity for Scouts to experiencing different cultures, religions and cuisines and gives the opportunity to meet people from around the globe. Between the 36 Scouts and four leaders, we need to raise in the region of £160,000 to be able to attend the WSJ. This amount covers the cost of travel and accommodation, food, activities, insurances, uniform and equipment needed for the event. A full breakdown is provided in the \"acceptance letter\" which is attached. Whilst the Scouts are from Bedfordshire, some of them who are selected to attend are from disadvantaged struggling backgrounds, foster care and have additional educational needs, however the key Scouting ethos is that Scouting is for all and we as leaders believe that no one should be excluded based on their background or economic status. This really is a once in a lifetime opportunity for these Scouts to attend, and we would like to be considered for a donation in order to support our journey. 21. Please briefly describe the project/activity

The grant would be used towards the rent for the hall of Southcott Lower school as a venue for our weekly meetings for Summer term 2022 (April-July). £15 per hour, for 1.25 hours x 12 sessions. – Girl guiding offers opportunities to girls in Linslade of all backgrounds and abilities. They learn new skills and make friends outside of their school circle. We offer opportunities they may otherwise not be able to access, particularly those from lower income families. For example, we plan a visit to a local animal sanctuary and a local Tae Kwondo coach will be teaching self defence. The girls learn to contribute to their community, learn about themselves and grow in self confidence through activities such as litter picking (last year) and tree planting (planned for Autumn 2022) as well as taking part in the May Day Fayre and Carnival (when possible). - Due to few members at present, subscriptions will not cover all running costs (rent, resources for activities, badges, volunteer training). Numbers have fallen during the pandemic. There are no savings, as restrictions on what we have been able to offer the girls over the last 2 years (due to Covid) meant we charged no or lower subs, and paid the annual subscription on their behalf for 2021. Costs have already been cut, reducing the length of our meeting and overlapping with the Brownie pack meeting, and opening/closing ourselves to avoid extra charges. Subs were raised in 2019 and we do not feel we can raise them again right now, given the shorter meeting times. We are planning various ongoing fundraising activities to pay rent in the future, and hope to increase the size of the group going forward back to original numbers, so that subs cover the rent.

We have also taken part in joint activities with other local groups, such as Pages Park youth club and Stock grove Nature watch group and seek to continue our aim of partnership within the town with other youth organisations.</p>

21.	<p>Please briefly describe the project, including:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Where it will take place - How the community of Leighton-Linslade will benefit - How the project supports the community - How have you identified the need for this project? - How will you assess the success of the project? <p>(if necessary please supply further details on a separate single sheet of paper)</p>	<p>Leighton / Linslade Woodcraft have been providing activities for children in the local area for 14 years, the last four of these at the Pages Pavilion.</p> <p>Our program of activities have been heavily affected in the past two years by the COVID 19 pandemic, with suspension of gatherings, restrictions on numbers allowed to meet both indoors and outside and hindering our efforts to maintain consistency and continuity for our young people. It has also had a significant impact on our ability to gather subscriptions / raise funds in order to meet our maintenance costs, namely our Hall hire fees and annual Registration costs to our National organisation.</p> <p>Our annual Registration fees for this year are £250.00 in addition to £12.50 per child registered.</p> <p>Our rental fees have been increased and we are currently running at a deficit of £10.00 per week. We have determined to ask our parents to make a one off contribution towards Registration fees of £12.50 per child to relieve the burden of costs and increase subscription fees (currently £2.00 per child per week).</p> <p>However many of our families have two children attending our evening group sessions and we feel that the combined effect of Registration contributions and increase of subscription fees may prove too much for some and may deter others from joining. Many of our children have sensory/physical and learning difficulties, many families are from low income and single parent households.</p> <p>Although we are proud and pleased to report that we have continued a program of Woodcraft activities throughout the past two years and have now an established membership of 16 young people, because of the surcharge on numbers, our Registration fee for this year is £350.00 and is due in February.</p> <p>We have a small group of dedicated volunteers (4) who provide a program of activities and remain committed towards a achieving a variety of future camps and educational events this year including an Woodcraft International camp in July/August (on our National organisation 95th anniversary). We plan now that COVID restrictions are easing, to concentrate on fund raising to facilitate taking as many of our young people to camp as possible but find ourselves constrained in meeting our immediate running costs.</p>

		Should our Grant Application be successful we intend to use the funds to settle our Registration costs and use any residual balance to pay a month's rent in advance for Pages Pavilion. This we hope will allow our Committee some breathing space to consolidate our financial obligations and continue our program of exciting experiences and learning opportunities for our young people.
